# 1. PURPOSE

To define the Intellectual Property rights of the ACT and provide guidance for students and researchers affiliated with the ACT on Intellectual Property issues.

## 2. DEFINITIONS

ACT is the Australian College of Theology Limited.

Academic staff refers to the teaching staff at affiliated colleges.

**Affiliated College** is an institution approved to offer an accredited higher education award of the ACT.

**The Board** or the College Board is the Board of Directors of the Australian College of Theology Limited.

**Higher Degree by Research candidate** is a candidate enrolled in the MTh, DMin, ThD and PhD degrees. Also known as an HDR candidate.

## 3. SCOPE

This policy applies to the Australian College of Theology Ltd, students enrolled in the Australian College of Theology, with special reference to Higher Degree by Research candidates, researchers affiliated with the Australian College of Theology, academic staff of the affiliated colleges of the Australian College of Theology, and those employed by the Australian College of Theology.

# 4. POLICY STATEMENT



In general, the Australian College of Theology asserts its Intellectual Property rights ownership over syllabi, data sets and its own reports and research, subject to the exceptions listed below. The ACT also supports academic staff, HDR candidates, and researchers to promote and disseminate their research, and so does not, in general, assert Intellectual Property rights over their work.

# 5. PRINCIPLES

- 5.1 The Australian College of Theology Ltd asserts Intellectual Property rights over the syllabi of all courses accredited by the Australian College of Theology and student data sets.
- 5.2 The Australian College of Theology Ltd does not assert Intellectual Property rights over any work of students enrolled in an Australian College of Theology course, and explicitly does not assert IP rights over the work of Higher Degree by Research candidates.
- In general, the Australian College of Theology Ltd will not assert Intellectual Property rights over the work of academic staff of any affiliated college of the ACT unless an explicit arrangement has been made to the contrary (for example, as part of a funding agreement).
- In general, the Australian College of Theology Ltd will not assert Intellectual Property rights over the research and scholarship outputs of staff of the ACT unless an explicit agreement has been made to the contrary (for example, as part of an employment contract or funding agreement).
- In general, the Australian College of Theology Ltd asserts Intellectual Property rights over the reports and work produced in the course of an ACT Ltd employee's duties, unless an explicit agreement has been made to the contrary.
- 5.6 ACT researchers, including HDR candidates, should be mindful that other individuals or groups may have a claim to a share of the IP rights of a project (for example, indigenous peoples, partner institutions or those who have funded the research) and should formalise an agreement on IP rights before commencement of the research.
